
The athletic teams for UTM's predecessor, Hall-Moody Institute, were named Sky-Pilots.





\*Cooper/Clement residents require an additional permit for each semester. It is the student's responsibility to obtain the additional permit from the Department of Public Safety, located in Crisp Hall, at the beginning of the Fall and Spring Semester.









If you don't have a Skyhawk Card yet, you will want to get one right away. You can get the card at the Bursar Office on the first floor of the Hall-Moody Administration Building, No. 23 on your Campus Map.

They will take your picture and put it on your student identification card, the Skyhawk Card. Your Skyhawk Card will also include your student identification number. Mine is all 7s, but yours will probably start with 960.

You can put money on your Skyhawk Card either online or by using the machine located in the computer lab on the first floor of the Library.

There are two different spending options available: Captain's Cash Account and Silver Account

The Captain's Cash Account can be used to purchase any food items on campus, excluding vending machines. Any unused funds in Captain's Cash will roll over from the Fall Semester to the Spring Semester, but at the end of the Spring Semester any unused funds will be forfeited. The funds are not refundable.

The Silver Account can be used anywhere on campus as cash. The funds roll over each semester and can be withdrawn for a \$15 service fee. The fee is waived if the funds are withdrawn upon graduation.

Hang on to this card! You've probably heard people talk about receiving the key to the city before. Well, your Skyhawk Card is your key to campus. You need one to do just about everything!

You can buy or rent textbooks from UTM's <u>Barnes & Noble</u> bookstore, located on the first floor of the Boling University Center. Our <u>bookstore</u> also features E-books, which are textbooks that can be accessed by laptop, tablet or smartphone. You can also rent textbooks for the semester and spend less than actually buying the books.

Another option is to buy or rent from <u>Bradley Book</u> <u>Company</u>, located at 118 Hurt St. in Martin, right on the edge of campus.

If you buy your textbooks from either location, you can sell your books back at the end of the semester.

There are also some great websites where you can buy textbooks, such as <u>chegg.com</u>, <u>amazon.com</u> and many other options. If you choose online purchasing order early enough to get your books before classes begin.

# Postal Services: You've got mail



UTM provides your postal services.

If you live in the dorms, your box located behind the front desk of your dorm.

If you live in University Village, you have an assigned box in Postal Services, located on the first floor the Boling University Center.

If you live off campus, you can request a box in Postal Services for a fee by showing your student ID, the Skyhawk Card.

Postal Services will send you an email if you receive a package. You will then have two days to pick up your package.

Postal Services offers the same services as the United States Postal Service, except express mail. Just a friendly reminder – packages are charged by weight.

- 1. Academic The primary focus of these groups is to increase student exposure within an academic discipline.
- 2. Club Sport These are competitive in nature but not recognized by UTM's NCAA athletics program. You have the opportunity to compete at a high level in local and national competitions.
- 3. Honor Society The primay focus is to allow students to be recognized for their academic achievement. They have national affiliations and membership is selective.
- 4. Multicultural These allow students to explore and celebrate various cultural identities. They also provide an outlet for students to meet others who share the same cultural identity.
- 5. Professional and Service Greek These are greek -lettered fraternities that are not social in their mission. They are structured around a specific service or professional discipline.
- 6. Recreation These embrace a topic or activity that is recreational in nature, but they are not a club sport.
- 7. Religious These provide an outlet for students to practice their chosen faith or religious discipline.
- 8. Service They allow students an opportunity to provide a service or service-based activity in the community.
- 9. Special Interest These allow students to explore various social causes and activities that are not recreational in nature.







The Paul Meek Library is the perfect place to study for exams or do research for class projects. It has a huge selection of books and periodicals you can check out.

The <u>library</u> also has over 250 <u>academic databases</u>. You can access these through the <u>library</u>'s card catalog or through the Paul Meek Library Catalog Search link on your UTMportal page. You can check out laptops, Kindles, cameras, DVDs, CDs, or VHS tapes from the Media

Center, located at the back of the <u>library</u> on the first floor. They also sell school supplies, educational

aids and offer lamination services in the Media Center.

There are group study rooms on the second floor, which work great when meeting your friends or classmates for study sessions.

Even if the <u>library</u> is closed, you always have access to a computer. The computer lab located on the first floor, adjacent to <u>Captain's Coffee</u>, stays open 24 hours a day.

The Help Desk, located on the second floor, can help you with any technical issues with your computer, such as login information.

Your <u>safety</u> is UTM's priority, and, because of this, we take precautions on and off campus.

Emergency text messages, or R.A.V.E. alerts, will notify you of any dangerous criminal activity on or near campus, severe weather near the Martin area, school closings or lockdowns. Go to <a href="https://www.getrave.com/login/utm">www.getrave.com/login/utm</a> to sign up for R.A.V.E. alerts.

Emergency call boxes are another great way to stay safe. If you need assistance, press the button on the call box and speak directly to the Office of Public Safety. There are 24 emergency call boxes located around campus, with locations marked on the map included on page 4. Familiarize yourself with their locations.

If you have a car and are planning on parking on campus, you'll need a parking sticker. Without one, you will get a ticket and be required to pay a fine. Check the <u>map</u> on page 4 to be sure you are parking in your mandated parking area. Certain parking areas are reserved for commuting students only, non-commuting or on-campus students only, and staff only. # Unfortunately, there will be times when you can't make it to class because of an illness or injury.

Don't worry, though, because <u>Student Health</u> offers free services such as medical diagnosis, treatment for acute illnesses, family planning services, well women exams and contraception management, including condoms.

Services that require a fee are lab tests, medications dispensed on site, administration of allergy shots and administration of immunizations.

If you feel like there just aren't enough hours in the day, never fear, walk-ins are accepted. However, appointments are strongly recommended.

Student Health's Counseling Services recommends appointments. However, they offer counseling to walk-ins 10 a.m.-2 p.m. Monday-Friday.

Student Health also offers two additional programs: Suicide Prevention and P.S.E.P.P., Personal Safety Empowerment Partnership Program, Count Me In. P.S.E.P.P. is for victims of domestic violence, sexual assault or stalking. Victims are referred to the correct services for help. Everything that is discussed is confidential.

BeanSwitch's goal is to present the best original creative writing and art from the students, staff and faculty of UTM, and the surrounding community.



#### RIFLE: Hardy M. Graham Stadium (Dacotah Faught)


- Finished season ranked in national top 20 in 31 of last 32
